- 3. The Context:

Karnatak Arts, Science and Commerce College established in the year 1970 and since then striving hard to deliver quality education to the students of this backward area. In our journey, we have noticed that number of meritorious students were discontinued their higher education due to financial problems, particularly the students those who are coming from rural areas. Therefore, to help them to reach their goals, we have formed a POOR STUDENT AID COMMITTEE (PSAC). This committee has been performing its sincere efforts to fulfill the requirements of the poor and meritorious students by providing various facilities such as College tuition fee, Bicycles, Books, Uniforms, ICT training etc.. 

- The Management, Board of Governing Council (BGC) and other administrative authorities were provided the guidelines and insisted them to identify more parameters which are directly and indirectly have an impact on the Institutional growth.
- Strictly instructed all faculty members of the various Departments to take part in the SWOT process. The number of open sessions organized varies from Department to Department.

- Though the sessions were organized for two-hours, in most of the cases the events were long-winded.
- The core committee meeting dates regarding Departmental and Institutional SWOT were 15th, 16th, and 20th of June, 2018.
- The views and feedback of the stakeholders, especially students, guardian's and alumni's view were recorded.
- Neutral facilitators supported with all necessary documents, literatures of SWOT, feedback formats, communication recorded with each stakeholder and ensured their presence including few of the alumni.
- Everybody was encouraged to express their candid views. Participation with equity during SWOT Analysis has been practiced with high esteem.




Figure 2: Members involved in the SWOT process

- Insufficient fund for research.
- Poor in quality publications with high impact factor Journals.

Opportunities:

- Owing to the strength as envisaged above, the institution has the potentiality to become autonomous Institution and this was also suggested by NAAC peer team in its exit report.
- The faculty members of the Department of Zoology, Botany, Chemistry and Urdu have high academic profiles; hence there is a great opportunity to go for PG and Doctoral programmes in their respective subjects, provided, the prerequisite infrastructural facilities are extended by the concerned administrative Department.
- In the present scenario of Bidar District, this is only college (CPE with A grade) has all the prerequisites to grab an opportunity of becoming a <u>"Cluster University"</u>, which is recently proposed by the Govt. of Karnataka.
- There is wide scope to initiate tourism related UG and PG courses, because, Bidar District has been identified by Tourism Ministry of India as one of the famous tourism places of the world.
- Bidar is one of the prominent Districts in Karnataka for producing sugarcane. Therefore, there is a huge opportunity to start sugarcane production related vocational/diploma courses in the college.

Threats:

- It is observed that traditional subjects viz Humanities, Pure Arts; Pure Science does not guarantee employability of the pass outs which poses a threat. Therefore, the Govt. has to take initiatives for diversification and vocationalization of courses so that students are ensured job opportunity.
- Insufficient teaching staff along with trained and skilled supporting staff poses a threat to the institutions to excel as an excellence centre of higher education. The

process of appointment of teachers in aided institutions is the biggest problem as the state Govt. has imposed a ban to appoint the faculty in place of retired and death cases.

- The introduction of adhocsim/contractualism for the last decade has damaged the fabric of colleges quality-wise & accountability which needs to be addressed to arrest the declining trend in these premier educational institutions.
- Sudden growth of technical education and no corresponding change in school education. The quality of entry into engineering is in question
- Attractive terms and conditions offered by industries to the brilliant students, reducing the availability of students for higher studies.
